<u>Teaching – Learning Methodology:</u> While lectures are used as a prominent pedagogical method, conscious efforts have been made to adopt innovative and participatory methods of teaching–learning.

- Interactive methods of teaching such as case studies, role play, student presentations, mock
   Parliament and group discussions are being used by faculty members in their day-to-day teaching.
- Other methods of learning experiences provided to students include industrial visits, participation in seminars and workshops, inter and intra college competitions, lecture series, guest lectures, organisation of exhibitions
- Experiential learning field work, visits to industries, hospitals and social organizations, working with NGOs
- Individual / team research projects, library assignments and surveys on current issues and subject topics
- Computer-assisted learning practicals and internet research are used. ICT training is facilitated
  with the college setting up an AV Room for usage of multimedia teaching aids with the help of
  computers and L.C.D projectors.
- Units to view educational telecasts through Colour Television cable/satellite receiving facility,
   TV tuner card (for recording and convenient replay of suitable educational programmes) and facilities for video conferencing have been installed.
- Language Laboratory for improving the communication skills of students coming from the regional medium of instruction
- Specific strategies are adopted for facilitating average and advanced learners.
   For the disadvantaged learners:
- Bilingual method of teaching is adopted to facilitate the understanding of students from the vernacular medium
- Need-based, student-friendly study-aids.
- Advanced learners are offered special opportunities to hone their special skills and add value to their degree, such as

- Evaluations are ICT enabled and some are online, multiple choice type questions, hence objective, speedy and economical.
- Examination Quality Control Cell to monitor difficulty level of question papers.
- Results are declared on the college website.
- Those students who fail to clear their examinations have a 'Yet to Clear' remark on their marksheets instead of the customary 'FAILED' remark.
- A Passing Certificate is issued to final year students as an interim measure before the final certificate is given by the University of Pune.
- The security of the mark sheet has been enhanced with a Hologram.
- Model Answers are put up for the students immediately after the exams.
- Students can apply for Revaluation and if not satisfied a photocopy of the Answer Paper is provided.

# 3.26 Major Activities during the year in the sphere of extension activities and Institutional Social Responsibility

- Social and Community service is seamlessly integrated as part of the co curricular activities. On an average the college conducts about 1 programme every week. Students accompanied by their class teachers visited orphanages, old age homes, institutes for the destitute, schools for the blind and handicapped and hospitals, providing them with material necessities like groceries, clothes, fruits, snacks, stationery items and story books. They also spent quality time with inmates of these institutions by entertaining them with games dance music programmes and street plays.
- The students of the college conducted a jumble sale of clothes and accessories the proceeds of which were given to charity.
- In order to boost its social outreach activities the college has tied up with five NGOs in the city-Centre for Environment Education, The Doorstep School (NGO that runs mobile schools for children of slum dwellers), 'Mitr' (NGO looking after underprivileged children), Prashanti (NGO involved in spreading awareness about cancer and in its treatment) and Connecting (an NGO that works for suicide prevention amongst youth and adults).
- During NSS Annual Camps, the volunteers have conducted surveys of the socio-economic status
  of poor families, built a compound wall at the Home for Ageing Blind, Khandala, cleaned up a
  Nala, development of a local school and even constructed eco friendly toilets at our adopted
  village at Lonikand.
- Blood Donation Camps are organized, fund raising for Blind Men's Association and for natural calamities, participating in a signature drive for protecting the Dhanori Lake in the vicinity of the college and joining the 'Save the hills' rally.

# 6. Governance, Leadership and Management

6.1 State the Vision and Mission of the institution

Vision Statement: To grow into a Centre of Excellence providing Quality Education and empowering women to take their place in society.

6.2 Does the Institution has a management Information System

Yes. Our MIS accesses a range of information and resources to help deliver the content and administer the various workflows in operational activities such as Online Admissions, Attendance records of students, Attendance records of employees, Casual Leave Records, Online feedback, Online Examinations, Question paper generator, Scheduling –Timetables & Examinations, Results of Examinations, printing of marks cards and result analysis ,Classroom mapping, Laboratory utility mapping and Work balance

6.3 Quality improvement strategies adopted by the institution for each of the following:

### 6.3.1 Curriculum Development

- Compulsory inclusion of emerging trends, experiential learning and genderspecific modules in syllabi. The syllabus is constructed to help women become independent thinkers and decision-makers.
- Inter-disciplinary programmes have been introduced. Students are allowed flexibility to choose one subject from an alternate stream.
- A diversified PT Course (compulsory for freshers) is offered with exciting options like Sports/ Athletics, Yoga and Self-Defense to all FY students.
- Some pragmatic courses to give students an exposure to real world situations and increase their employability have been designed.
- A well-structured Value Education course which is compulsory for all the students has been institutionalised as a credit based course.

### 6.3.2 Teaching and Learning

- Autonomy has brought about a new zeal and zest in the faculty members. The
  college has made efforts to make all faculty computer literate. This has seen a
  surge in the usage of ICT enabled pedagogy.
- Interactive methods of teaching such as case studies, role play, student presentations, mock Parliament and group discussions are being used by a large number of faculty members in their day-to-day teaching.
- Other methods of learning experiences provided to students include industrial visits, participation in seminars and workshops, inter and intra college competitions, lecture series, guest lectures, organisation of exhibitions.
- A Language Laboratory for improving the communication skills of students coming from the regional medium of instruction has been set up.
- Specific strategies are adopted for facilitating average and advanced learners

### 6.3.3 Examination and Evaluation

- Implementing our own unique brand of 'stress free' modules of examinations.
- The internal assessment system is not only a system of continuous assessment but of frequent assessment as well. As part of internal assessments every course includes Flexi-tests, which essentially involve project work that requires research beyond the textbook. The Flexi Tests may be in the form of a seminar /class test / submission of study report / open book exam, / oral presentations / field visits, etc.
- Evaluations are ICT enabled making them objective, speedy and economical. The Online Objective Type Examination Package has been acquired.

### 6.3.4 Research and Development

- NVIVO-a quantitative data analysis package and SPSS-a qualitative data analysis package to promote research have been acquired.
- Young teachers are motivated to undertake research projects by their HODs. Extra API points are allotted to those HODs who are successful in doing so.
- Administrative and technical assistance is provided to teachers undertaking research projects.
- A few courses have incorporated the basics of Research Methodology in their syllabi to encourage student research.
- An Orientation Course informing teachers about different funding agencies is conducted.

### 6.3.5 Library, ICT and physical infrastructure / instrumentation

- Extension of Library to almost double its former size
- Audio Visual rooms for usage of multi media teaching aids and presentations
- Creation of Wi-Fi zones, subscription to e-journals and use of customized educational software
- Increase in equipment for ICT enabled teaching computers, CD writers, printers, LCD projectors, large screens, broad band connection in the labs as well in the library, smart T.V., etc. The computers in the administrative unit are connected with LAN and 5MBPS ILP Link.
- A Language Laboratory
- Digitalisation of the library. Digital library section containing online journal databases including NLIST programme of INFLIBNET, EBSCO Literary Reference Centre, EBSCO Academic Search Elite and JSTOR. Installation of the SLIM software.

- Construction of departmental cubicles with separate computers to help in the extensive use of facilities.

### 6.3.6 Human Resource Management

#### Annexure II - Analysis of Feed Back on Syllabus Content and Teaching

- An important quality enhancement measure practiced by the IQAC is the structured student feedback on the syllabus, the examination and the evaluation, on the teaching methods of teachers in class as well as on the co-curricular activities students would like to have. Feedback is also taken from the students to improve services in the canteen, parking lot and common areas.
- It is an online mechanism and is taken once a semester for all undergraduate and post graduate programmes conducted in the College.
- The Course content of each subject is evaluated on the basis of the following parameters: Depth of the course content including project work if any; extent of coverage of course; applicability/ relevance to real life situations; learning value (in terms of knowledge, concepts, manual skills, analytic abilities and broadening prospectives) clarity and relevance of textual reading material; relevance of additional source material (library / internet); extent of effort required by students.
- The faculty is likewise evaluated on the basis of the following parameters: Knowledge base of the teacher; communication skills; sincerity/commitment; regularity and punctuality; interest generated by the teacher; ability to integrate content with other courses; Quality and effectiveness of class-room teaching; provision of opportunities for interaction; accessibility of the teacher in and out of the class(includes availability of the teacher to motivate further study and discussion outside the class); ability to design quizzes/tests/assignments/examinations and projects to evaluate students' understanding of the course; provision of sufficient time for feedback (revision) etc.; Attitude to students/cordial relationship with students on academic issues; Completion of syllabus during the academic session conduct of extra lectures if needed.
- The students are asked to mark the teachers' on a scale of 1 to 5 where 1 represents that which is least effective and 5 represents 'excellent'. These points are then interpreted as percentages and the feedback is provided to the concerned teachers.
- The Feedback is assessed and analysed by every Head of the Department and a meeting is arranged to appreciate or improve (as the case may be) the performance of the teacher. This feedback is also used by teachers for self improvement and organization of activities for students.
- The analysis for the Feed Back for the year 2013-2014 showed an overall high satisfaction with the course content of every subject. Some teachers were found deficient in punctuality and some had low accessibility. Suggestions and recommendations were given to the concerned teachers at the interaction meeting.

#### **ANNEXURE -III- Two Best Practices of the Institution**

**Best Practice 1:** Inclusion of 'experiential learning' as one of the innovative components of the Autonomous syllabi.

- 1) Title: Under Autonomy the syllabus designed by our teachers has several innovative components to help women become independent thinkers and decision-makers. Some of the innovative components are inclusion of emerging trends, **experiential learning** and gender-specific modules in the syllabi.
- 2) Goal: Autonomy has helped us devise a syllabus which has resulted in academic and intellectual stimulation and is geared to generate employment. Academic autonomy has given us the freedom to offer value additions to the students in terms of content, methods and materials. It has given us the opportunity to design pragmatic course structures which give students an exposure to real world situations and increase their employability for some of the most coveted jobs in the industry.
- 3) **The Context:** Almost all subjects in the Science, Commerce and Arts Streams have made the 'experiential learning component' a compulsory part of their course. However, keeping in mind the constraints of space two popular cases will be discussed in detail:
  - a) **Business Entrepreneurship**, being a subject that talks about facing challenges, starting enterprises and being innovative we decided to add an extra dimension to the teaching of the subject. The focus is not on making students entrepreneurs as much as it is on making them entrepreneurial. In today's competitive world, students need to explore their environment, exploit opportunities, fight against odds and be motivated to achieve.
  - b) One of the major thrust areas of the **Psychology department** is on the applied aspect of psychology. The department has concentrated on developing a scientific rigor in the students and helping them make the connect from text books to real life.
- **4) The Practice: a) The Entrepreneurial Development Cell** was established in the college with the help of MCED (Maharashtra Centre for Entrepreneurship Development) in 1993.

The activities of the EDC began as a practical assignment for the undergraduate Business Entrepreneurship students. It was aimed at instilling the entrepreneurial spirit among the students by motivating them to take to manufacturing and trading activities. and to develop purchasing, organising, communicating, marketing, team building and accounting skills among them. These included making and/or sale of jewellery, chocolates, gel, candles, phenyl, pottery and paintings, etc. The main objective was to give the students art, craft, and culinary skills so that they convert their hobbies into business activities and become economically independent.

A few years later it took the form of an intra – college competition where students of other disciplines too got an opportunity to showcase their entrepreneurial skills. The popularity of the event soon turned it into an inter college activity and in 2003 it took the shape of the 'Mira Bazaar'. Today it is organised on a grand scale with a number of institutes and a good number of women entrepreneurs participating. The Mira Bazaar also provides a platform for networking for women entrepreneurs of the city.

Membership to the EDC is limited to the Final Year students who have opted for B.E. as one of their subjects. Out of these the finer grain (about 60 students) are selected to run the activities of the EDC. A nominal fee of Rs.150/- is charged. Although the cocoordinator of the EDC would have liked to limit the no. of students to 30, generally the membership swells to 60. The activities of the Cell include Conducting workshops and Industrial visits, carrying out feasibility studies, Making Business Plans, Idea generation, Achievement Motivation Training and organizing the 'Mira **Bazaar'.** 

A Core Committee of about 10-15 Third Year students is formed. This committee consists of and is responsible for planning all the important issues related to the Mira Bazaar. This is the Planning and the Decision making body. The other students are assigned to different committees that look after items like Sending out invitations, working out stall space, Procuring Sponsorships, Communicating with the Media, Accounting, Inviting entries, Assigning stall numbers, Issue of entry passes, Account of footfalls, etc.

b) Students of **Special Psychology**, do an actual Research Project as part of their Research Methodology paper. The students of TYBA work on research projects right from the stage of conceptualizing the problem area to statistical analysis and interpretation of their findings. The research areas ranged from understanding marital attitudes among different age groups, life satisfaction and happiness in senior citizens to exploring emotional coping patterns in the youth.

This is one of the salient aspects of the department as these activities are usually seen only at postgraduate level.

The paper on 'Abnormal Psychology' has books by foreign authors that use examples typical to western contexts. In order to connect these texts to real life situations, the students are taken for field visits to local centres of mental health and models applicable to local contexts are used. Regular field visits to Agencies working in mental health such as Muktangan de-addiction centre, Yerwada Mental hospital, Kamayani institute for the intellectually challenged, Schizophrenia Awareness association, NAB Home for the Aging blind, Prasanna Autism Centre, Chaitanya Home for the Mentally ill, Connecting-Centre for prevention of youth suicide and Centre for Advocacy in Mental health are regularly conducted for the students.

5) **Evidence of Success: a)** Generally, the adult entrepreneurs show a turnover between Rs. 75,000 and Rs. 85,000; while the students' turnover ranges between Rs. 25,000 and Rs. 50,000.

A very satisfying event for the teachers as well as the students because theoretical knowledge is translated into practice. It is a learning experience for students.

Analysis of success and failure is done in the class at the end of every 'Mira Bazaar'. It has been found that less than 1% suffers a loss. That is because during the course of the 'Mira Bazaar', students are seen to conduct market surveys and accordingly improvise and diversify on the spot. This encourages a spirit of healthy competition and develops in them the ability to work together.

That an Intra college activity has grown into a programme that offers a platform for women entrepreneurs of the city is itself an indication of its success.

The HOD of the department is invited to offer consultancy to engineering and management institutes for establishing an EDC in their college.

In July 2013, the department has published a monograph titled, 'Empresario' (meaning 'The Entrepreneur' in the Spanish language) which is a compilation of entrepreneurial exercises given to the students of business entrepreneurship.

b) One of our students employed at the Centre for Advocacy in Mental health as Research Associate directly after her graduation received a special complimentary letter for having shown 'scientific rigor' in her working.

### 6) Problems encountered and resources required:

- a) Lack of financial support from outside agencies does not allow the EDC to conduct it on a large scale the Women's Entrepreneur Show has taken place only twice; Space crunch, is another demotivating factor. Adequate security arrangements have to be made for storing wares; Although live interaction between real entrepreneurs and students enhances their understanding of ground realities, the students are deprived of the hands on experience of being in an entrepreneur's shoes.
- b) No problems are encountered for conducting 'field visits'. All T.Y.B.A. (Special Psychology) students invest both time and money for these trips and research studies.

#### Best Practice 2: Institutionalising 'Value Education' as a Credit Based Course.

- 1) Title: For nearly fifty years, our Sanctuary Period, devoted to the promotion of ideals and values, has been deeply appreciated by all our visitors. Under Autonomy it has now been internalized as our credit based course on value education.
- 2) Goal: While we do not compromise on our excellence in academics and extracurricular activities, our emphasis is essentially on character building education. In all our academic pursuits, we have never lost sight of our ideals of simplicity, service and value inculcation which remain at the root of all our developmental activities. While we train the students to sharpen their intellect, we also sensitize their hearts through social and community service which is seamlessly integrated as a part of the curriculum in the form of co-curricular activities. Our USP continues to be imparting value based education. To help fructify our character-building endeavors we have institutionalised a well-structured Value Education course, which is compulsory for all our students.
- 3) The Context: St. Mira's College was established in 1962 as one of the pioneering colleges set up exclusively for girls in this part of the country. It was the dream realization of our Revered Founder Sadhu T.L.Vaswani, who was a born teacher, a modern thinker, a builder with a futuristic vision. It was out of his vision that St. Mira's was born. Sadhu Vaswani, with his intuitive foresight, believed deeply in woman-power and woman-spirit, long before feminism was even thought of.

Starting as a college with just over sixty students, St. Mira's College today provides education right up to the PG level for over 3000 girl students across the Arts, Commerce, Science and Management faculties. Besides the basic BA and B Com degrees, it offers the highly sought after BBA, BCA, BCS undergraduate degrees, M.Com as well as MA in Sociology, English and

Economics. Academic excellence with an eye on global perspectives complements aspects such as love for Indian ideals, community outreach, spiritual unfolding and reverence for humanity. Reflecting these ideals, the College mission statement unfolds as: Empowerment of women students through an integrated education of the head, the hand and the heart shaped by character and competence building.

4) The Practice: Among the unique features of the College, the College Sanctuary takes pride of place. Our daily curriculum begins with the Sanctuary where the students are taught that life is larger than livelihood and the end of knowledge is service. The 30 minute sanctuary period, serves as a focal point in imparting holistic education. We use this daily period to inculcate moral and ethical values, to build character and competence, impart reverence for all forms of life, to build sensitivity to social and national issues and to develop in the students life coping skills. It provides a platform for group counseling. Common problems faced by youth such as depression, anorexia, inferiority complex, sexual harassment are addressed by competent and qualified resource persons.

Through the forum of the sanctuary, students of all disciplines are given basic awareness of their constitutional rights, privileges as well as their civic duties and responsibilities as citizens of a democratic, secular republic. This time is devoted to prayer, reflection and sharing of thoughts on the ART OF LIVING. Indian ideals and the eternal values of life are sought to be inculcated in the students, through this unique feature of the college. Every day there is a talk that has either an inspirational message regarding values or relates to the students in terms of career, development and growth, relationships, attitude to life, commitment and goals.

5) Evidence of Success: Not only is the sanctuary a crucial part of an aim to impart value based education, it also fosters a strong sense of belonging among teachers and students. It serves as an assembly which promotes cultural and religious harmony. At the sanctuary heroes of humanity and saints of all religions are remembered on their birth/death anniversaries. Interfaith prayers are conducted. Important festivals and sacred days of all religions are observed. Over and above all this, the sanctuary provides an excellent opportunity for students to develop their skill in public speaking. Their interest in music is also cultivated by the community singing of kirtan, bhajans and hymns, which is actively encouraged.

Our unique concept of imparting values through a daily session carved out for the purpose has indeed impacted many students and it is in their sharing of experiences even long after they have left college, that we comprehend the success of our method.

6) Problems encountered and resources required: No problems regarding either monetary resources or human resources has been encountered so far. The college has constructed a Sanctuary Hall where students along with the staff assemble every morning for this special session. The Sanctuary Hall is equipped with an efficient sound system, an LCD / overhead projector and a screen. The students and teachers actively and whole heartedly participate in all the activities that take place in the Sanctuary.

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
