
What are we waiting for?






THE USE AND EFFECT OF MUSIC IN FILMS AND TV SHOWS


The loud tune of dhum-tana-nana in the background is painful on the ears, but fitting to the gaudy portrayal of the characters.

"Music in films should have the same relationship to the film drama as somebody's piano playing in my living room has on the book I'm reading."




